Fireman's Muster Planning for Tricentennial



The Union No. 1 was built in 1867 by the William Hunneman Co. of Boston, MA one of the leading hand engine builder in America at the time. It was restored by the F.D. Newton Veteran Fireman's Association and is their engine for muster competitions.

Save the Date: July 17, 2025

At the Tricentennial Committee's meeting on June 11, Jamie Falconi and David Falconi of the F.D. Newton Veteran Fireman's Association proposed hosting a Fireman's Muster as part of Southborough's Tricentennial Celebration. The committee voted unanimously to reserve July 17, 2027 for a showdown of teams testing their skills.

A Fireman's Muster is a spirited event that celebrates the history and camaraderie of firefighting. Teams compete in challenges showcasing traditional techniques and teamwork, using hand-pumped fire engines, or "handtubs," to test their skills in pumping water and precision spraying. Southborough's own handtub, *Union*, will take center stage during this lively competition.

The four-hour event promises excitement and fun for all ages, with firefighting teams from neighboring communities expected to participate for prizes and bragging rights. To complement the muster, the day will also feature a Family Barbecue, bringing together residents and visitors for good food, great company, and a celebration of community spirit.

This unique event offers a perfect blend of tradition, entertainment, and togetherness, and we hope it will be a memorable highlight of Southborough's Tricentennial.

A Little History of Handtubs and Musters

From colonial times through the Civil War, hand fire engines were the primary source of fire protection in America. Large numbers of men were required to operate these "handtubs" and often times local fire companies became an important part of the fabric in many communities.

In the late 1850's fire engine manufacturers started to develop the steam powered fire engine thus retiring the old handtubs. Veteran Fireman's Associations were formed in order to keep the camaraderie of these old machines alive.

The Muster is a competition between several fire associations. Each association has it's own fire truck which is maned by as many "pumpers" as possible. The goal is build pressure and measure the longest stream of water on a cardboard track. The muster attracts many associations and the F.D. Newton Veteran Fireman's Association from Southborough will be one of the participants

Heritage Day 2027 Moved to Sunday

At the request of the Tricentennial Committee, the Select Board voted on June 17 to move Heritage Day 2027 to Sunday, October 10th. This change honors Yom Kippur, which begins at sundown that evening.

To accommodate all, the Tricentennial Grand Parade will start later than the usual Heritage Day parade to avoid conflicts with morning religious services, and all festivities will conclude before sundown.

The circular dam on Middle Road is part of the Sudbury Reservoir system—an engineering marvel completed in 1898 to supplement Boston's water supply

Designed as a runoff spillway or culvert inlet, its distinctive round shape channels water efficiently from the reservoir into downstream aqueducts, helping to regulate flow and prevent erosion—an innovative solution at the time.

A picturesque glimpse into 19th-century waterworks engineering, the dam represents Southborough's critical role in shaping Boston's modern water infrastructure.
