


## Q2 Which sources did you use to learn about the Neary school project? (Select all that apply.)












To build broader support and trust, I would encourage the new building committee to present all options, including those previously rejected, along with a clear explanation of why they were not pursued. Transparency in this process is key. A full breakdown of costs for each proposal, even those not selected, would also help residents better understand the financial landscape. In particular, the committee should clearly outline the tax implications both with and without the new school, so residents can see the actual projected impact, which is likely much smaller than many assume. While the children are currently receiving a strong education, it's also important to listen to those working in the building every day. A survey of current educators in that facility should be shared to provide firsthand insight into the limitations and challenges of the current environment. While a new building may not directly change the curriculum or quality of instruction, research and real-world examples from other towns have shown that modern educational spaces can positively impact student learning, engagement, and overall well-being. While not part of the Neary project specifically, I would also suggest addressing the broader vision for Southborough's growth, particularly the town's interest in attracting more commercial development to offset residential taxes. It's important to clarify that while this is a goal, it falls outside the scope of the building committee's responsibilities, to avoid false expectations. As for a modified proposal, I would be open to supporting it if it included: Improved communication strategies to explain the project's long-term benefits to the town Environmental considerations integrated into the design and site planning A detailed look at alternative phasing or costsaving measures that could still meet educational needs Ultimately, I believe the project could gain broader support if the town feels genuinely informed and heard throughout the process.




## Q12 Did you attend the Special Town Meeting on May 10, 2025 where the Neary School Building Project was discussed and voted on?

# Q13 What were the main reason(s) you decided to attend the Special Town Meeting? (Select all that apply.)










### Q32 Do you currently have any children in your household in the following age/grade ranges? (Select all that apply.)

#### Q33 Please select your age group. (Select one.)




#### Q34 What is your approximate annual household income?
